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

# Roland SH101

# Forgotten Analogue

Sick of looking around for a TB-303? Or is it a bit out of your budget? The Roland SH-101 could well be a refreshing alternative...

The SH-101 is a classic 'lots of sliders' analogue synthesiser, which enables you to tweak the sounds in real-time quite well. Its small size also means that some of the sliders can be quite sensitive, which adds to the allure of this piece of equipment. The 101 is both monophonic and monotimbral (just like the 303), so it's definitely not so attractive as an acoustic instrument. It has no effects and no expansion

capabilities, as what would be expected from something of its age. However, its powerful on-board sequencer along with all the above features do make up for its shortfalls, making it a valid contender as a acid/bassline generator to the 303.

## 303-Emulation

For those who are interested in doing so, here are a few start-up hints for on-board settings: Waveform - full and pure sawtooth VCF - Roughly half-way for both frequency and resonance; VCA - Gate: ENV- Gate & Trigger and zero settings for Attack, Sustain and Release; VCO - Range of 16, Pulse Width of 10 and mode to manual; and lastly and quite importantly - set Portamento to Auto and the dial at between 3 and 6. Some careful adjustments will be required to get the exact sound you want (remember the sliders are quite sensitive), and especially so if you are distorting the sounds on your mixing desk.

On-board Sequencer

Just like its more infamous successor, the on-board sequencer is the key to some impressive output. The little known "slur" and "tie" features enables sliding effects akin to its 303 cousin. To take advantage of this feature, make sure all your sound settings are ready, set Portamento to Auto 2, and then press the Legato button in the same way you would press the 303 Slide button whilst programming your riff. Another handy feature on the SH-101 is the ability to synchronise the modulator and the sequencer. This feature effectively sets a different but fixed modulator setting to each note played on the sequencer - very handy for energetic acid sequences. One criticism is the lack of the Accent function, which puts the hardfloor style squelching acid sounds out of

### MIDI-fied

The SH-101 is not a MIDI instrument. A bridging interface like a MIDI-note to CV/Gate converter is required to integrate the Roland SH-101 into a digital recording studio. laborious Some calibrating and tuning can be expected to get one of these sync's working. Alternatively riffs can be sampled and played instead real-time adjustments will not be possible.

## Ancillary Features The mod-grip

capability of the SH-101 makes it a pretty funky supplement to live

performances. Its small size and narrow octave range also add to this. It also comes in different colours, further making this point. And an extra for those who are adventurous, the SH-101 can pump out some massive kickdrums too.

All in all, the Roland SH-101 probably deserves a good 8 out of 10, again due to price. You can expect to be able to pick one up for around \$500. The sync might add to the cost slightly, but still well below the \$2,000 mark for the TB-303.







knowledgeable, billionaire husband Charles Morse (Sir Anthony Hopkins) set off to Alaska for a fashion shoot. Robert (who has some underlying murderous intent). Steven and Charles take an amphibious plane from the shoot to find a local native man to pose with Mickey, being out bear hunting they fly off to find him, straight into the path of a flock of birds, now comes the most

frightening moment in film history (for me anyway), the crash. The way this was shot, as with the entire movie, was so real it had me grabbing at my seat for safety. The pilot dies and the three are left to fend for themselves in the woods and must try to get back to where they will be found by the inevitable search party.

Not to ruin the story for you, they come across plenty of obstacles on their way, thankfully Charles knows absolutely everything about everything courtesy of his constant reading, and gets them

out of tight situations. Their biggest problem though is a giant Kodiak bear, a manhunter who stalks them. The three are constantly chased by the

bear, these scenes are so realistic you can feel the fear of the characters. As is the eventual fight scene with the bear as well as many, many very real and intensly painful scenes. IOm being careful not to ruin anything for you, this film is definitely best left a total suprise.

Alec Baldwin and Anthony Hopkins shine in the most impressive roles of their careers as does Harold Perrineau (Romeo & Juliet), Thankfully Elle Macpherson has a very small role, we are still treated to her Australian/American/ English accent however as well as her nonexistant acting ability but this certainly doesnOt take away from the impact

of the film in any way.

The Edge is a brilliantly rugged "boys" adventure/suspense film minus the usual macho garbage. I would have to give it a 9/10. Starts Thursday February 19 @ cinemas everywhere.

Starring: Jack Nicholson, Helen Hunt, Greg Kinnear Directed by James L. Brooks. Tri-star Rated: M

Manipulation. Movies have always been made to manipulate the emotions of their audience. The mechanics of this trickery are often painfully transparent. The strength of this film is that you won't realise you've been tricked until you're half way home in your car, and even then, you won't care.

The film's all-too-familiar subject examines the relationships of three damaged, neurotic, New York City-dwellers. Nicholson plays Melvin Udall, a writer of trashy romance novels who suffers an obsessive/compulsive disorder, which has left him socially maladjusted in the extreme... or perhaps he's just a bigoted. homophobic bastard anyway! Melvin's life is ruled by patterns, which his disorder has intractably set in stone, and ritualistically he complies. From avoiding cracks in the pavement to eating at the same restaurant everyday, his life allows no deviation and no time or patience to consider his effect on those around him.

The woman in Melvin's life is Carol (Helen Hunt) the only restaurant waiter with enough courage to take his order and stand up to his abuse, but it is Melvin's gay neighbour Simon (Greg Kinnear), a

successful painter, who is the main target for his insults. The lives of Carol and Simon contain great problems of their own which slowly penetrate Melvin's world until his patterns begin to crumble and he is forced to rediscover his humanity.

It's a Scrooge-story: crusty old man with a heart of gold. Throw in a cute dog and there won't be a dry eye in the house. A very basic formula, but it's raised to new heights by the performances, the dialogue and the

Jack Nicholson will always play Jack Nicholson (as will Christian Slater) but

here the character calls for his trademark self, right down to the trademark sunglasses. Nicholson delivers insults with a casual brutality that makes you laugh even as you cringe in empathy for his victims but he also displays a here-to-for unseen vulnerability in this performance, which is powerfully moving. Stronger still, is the performance by Helen Hunt. An affectingly honest portrayal



of a lonely and harried single parent, imbuing her character with warmth and quiet dignity. Greg Kinnear, whom you may recognise as a former reporter for the vacuous Entertainment This Week, proves again - as he did in Sabrina - that he can hold his own among the formidable company. Cuba Gooding as Simon's art dealer and Shirley Knight as Carol's monther provide accomplished support.

Director and co-scripter James L. Brooks has given what could have been a treacly, sentimental movie a lot of edge through his unsympathetic treatment of the main character and a very dark sense of humour (who could expect less from one of the chief developers of The Simpsons). The dialogue is sharp and witty, especially in Melvin's case, and yet it never seems anything less than natural out of the mouths of these three fine actors

As Good As it Gets is just that - movie making at it's best. It'll make you laugh. It'll make you cry. And if, like me, you think you're too jaded to fall for that, you're in for a surprise.

Highlights of the night were "Outfission" (Infusion's alter-ego), "Frankie Knuckles", "Boo Boo & Mace", "Marmion" & "Fluke", and with many of the local DJ's proving that they can equal or better an international DJ

or act of high standard. When the rain came down at midnight and didn't really stop until 6am, many people decided to call it a night, although the most fun was certainly had in the morning - diving in and out of mud baths.

On a more regular note, here's another serving of tasty toons for all you vinyl-hungry beasts:

# BOILER / POB (SEISMIC)

There's always at least one record each issue that is undeniably the record of the month - this time round the award goes to Paul Brogden (POB) with his double A-side release BOILER/BEAST. Both tracks follow the familiar Platypus arrangement, with unusual percussive fills, warped acid bassline and arpeggio builds. Although this one far surpasses anything that has been on Platypus in the last 12 months and even betters his last release on Seismic "The Essence". A feature sample is the use of a roaring elephant, which blasts on a big system, scaring the shit out of any punters within a five-metre radius of the speakers. When playing it for the first time at Sublime in Sydney, I apparently sent at least three green-faced people rushing to the toilets in a tripped out frenzy - they thought they were on a safari. Now any record that does that deserves a 10/

# PURPLE (Sasha Remix) / GUS GUS (SHOCK)

After at least a year's break from the remix duties, the UK's Sasha gets together with Icelandic band Gus Gus, and retunes their instruments. The result is a big breakbeat builder, layer upon layer of lush strings and arpeggio synth runs, gated vocals and funky bass. It's an unusual combination, but works well at the start or very end of a set.

# WHAT THE HELL IS SO FUNNY? / TATANA (LIQUID)

This 3-track from Germany is rather cool. The stunning Tatana makes her debut release through Liquid after guesting on vocals for many other German acts throughout 1997. Surprisingly though, she doesn't make a vocal appearance on any of the tracks, opting instead for 2 chunky minimal techno tracks, and a very funky and funny title track. "What The Hell..." clocks in at only 122bpm, whilst "Indian Summer" and "All The Time" are a typical 126-135bpm. Works well in the mix. 7/10

# EYE BEE M (REMIXES) / COMMANDER TOM (NOOM)

Just when you thought that Noom had gone right off the deep end, new mixes of Eye Bee M by Timo Maas and Oliver Lieb put them right back on top. The Timo Maas mix reminds me slightly of the classic "Follow Me" by Jam & Spoon. A collection of funky beats, analogue blips, and a continuous synth pad which just gets louder and louder in the break until a huge bass drop when the beat kicks back in - which sends 'em screaming, 8½/10

# MAMA KONDA (REMIXES) / ORINOKO (3 LANKA)

The original release of this came out back in September 1997, and has been a favourite and staple of my set since then - until now. Hardfloor return to form with their epic mix of Mama Konda, reminiscent of Hardfloor remixes like "Blue Monday 95" and "Yeke Yeke". Progressive drum rolls and acid lines may have all been done before, but it sure does still sound good when done by the innovators themselves. Get it. 9/10

# RADIO EDITS:

\*Daft Punk return to 12 inch with another cut from their latest album, this one with a Roger Sanchez remix "Revolution 909"

\*Another old classic from 1991 has been remixed and rereleased (soon there won't be any left...). This time Convert's "Nightbird" (Wonderboy) gets the remix treatment from Tin Tin Out & Magic Alec, but it's the Dutch who deliver the goods with the Vincent De Moor mix coming out trumps. There's also a second 12" of speed garage mixes by 187 Lockdown & Jason Nevins if you're interested.

\*The old Giorgio Moroder track "Chase", once redone by Midi Xpress in 1996, receives an airing again in 1998 with the help of Trance Atlantic Air Waves (Virgin), with a suprisingly "not too cheesy" mix from DJ Quicksilver.

And finally... \* Dave Angel releases probably his finest work since "Fever" with the all-new "Funk Music" (Island). The original mix with one of those basslines that you know but just can't put your finger on and a DJ Tonka mix thankfully showing us that there's a lot more to his repertoire than Hypertrophy.

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# Hello and welcome to the second edition of

the Make-up Movement. Last issue I explained the difference between department and specialty make-up stores. Hopefully, you would have taken my advice and have found the listing of make-up suppliers listed in the yellow pages. This now brings me to the next topic, Foundations. For those who are used to only ever purchasing a liquid foundation and are not aware of the different textures and uses, here are the different types of foundations:

# Liquid Foundation

Probably the most popular form of foundation, Perfect for a natural or

translucent look on clear or young healthy skin. This foundation won't give a thick coverage on imperfect or flawed skin textures but will give great coverage on clear on unflawed skin.

Camouflage Foundation

This foundation exudes one of the most beautiful natural finishes. It is suitable for skin textures that need extreme coverage. This foundation can be used for trouble spots such as scan or acne, or can also be applied to the entire face.

# Cream Foundation

THE MAKE UP MOVEMENT

A foundation for older skin or younger skin requiring greater coverage. Heavy or uneven application can leave an undesired cake finish. Best if used sparingly.

Panstick Foundation - Not suitable for everyday wear, this foundation is ideal for theatre or stage, because of the heavy density of the pigment.

Pancake foundation - This reflects a flat look and is mostly used as body make-up. This water based foundation usually dries to a matte finish.

# Tips when choosing a foundation:

Cheaper brands of foundation often have a pink undertone. Skin nearly always has a yellow undertone with a pink blend, never the other way around.

Define your skin tone, it is either: Normal beige, yellow consistent tone; Sallow - a vellowish, blue undertone; Olive - greenish in

colour; Ruddy – Reddish colour.

If you have dry skin, a moisturiser can be mixed with the foundation before application With the exception of oily panstick foundations, all foundations should be set with powder




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
